






Respiratory Virus Update

Increase in Invasive group A streptococcal infections in BC




Figure 1. Invasive group A streptococcal disease cases and annual incidence rates by year, British Columbia, January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2022; predicted annual incidence (cases and rate) for 2023 adjusted for seasonality shown in blue.

Increase in invasive group A streptococcal infections in children

- *S. pyogenes* typically causes mild illness (e.g. pharyngitis, cellulitis)
- Severe complications: Sepsis, pneumonia, necrotizing fasciitis, toxic shock
 - Those under 5 years of age or over 60 years of age at higher risk
- Difficult to differentiate iGAS infections from viral illness in children; can progress rapidly
- Presentations to watch for:
 - Fever for \geq 5 days in child of any age; any fever in child < 3 months old
 - Sandpaper rash, strawberry tongue
 - Respiratory distress, difficulty waking, rapid progression
- Testing not recommended for mild cases consistent with viral illness
- Prevention: Influenza and COVID-19 vaccination

Homelessness Increasing

- 4,821 homeless in Metro Vancouver (point-in-time) count on March 7, 2023)
- 32% ↑ since 2020
- 50% (2,420) in Vancouver
- 33% Indigenous
 - 64% lived or have generational experience with residential schools
- Health conditions:

 \circ 45% have a medical condition

 \circ 49% mental health issues

 \circ 63% addictions

 Recent issue: Increase in refugees in Vancouver shelters (Est: 200-275)


